Proud to be a Partner

Berks Nature partners with many organizations and individuals as we work to protect the environment and connect people to nature and conservation. We partner with governmental agencies like municipalities, water authorities, Army Corps and the Natural Resource Conservation Servicee to do demonstration projects, storm water improvement activities and trail improvement. We partner with local organizations and agencies to accomplish

watershed wide stream restoration, including, County Department of Agriculture and The County Department of Agriculture. We partner with individuals and families to protect their land, to volunteer, to monitor our waterways through community science programs, and to participate and be involved in our programming and the life of The Nature Place. We partner with numerous other non-profits, like Berks Area Mountain Biking Association (BAMBA), the Visitors Bureau, and the Chamber to help elevate the conservation conversation and demonstrate how nature is essential to our quality of life. And we partner with our members and donors to help make their philanthropic gestures make real life differences in the lives of Berks County residents and our environment.

All of these partnerships are unique and important to our work. However, there is a special partnership that we have been a



part of for the pasts four years that I would like to share a little bit about: The Alliance for Watershed Education, or AWE.

The Alliance for Watershed Education is a regional initiative of 23 partnering environmental education centers- all located along a Circuit Trail or major connecting trail, and on waterways throughout the Delaware River Watershed in Delaware, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. (Visit www.watershedalliance.org/ centers to see a list of them all!). The Alliance shares a mission

to provide education and recreational opportunities that inspire personal conservation action, improve water quality, strengthen community ties, and increase access to trails and waterways. The Alliance is a national model to help similar ecosystems and vulnerable national waterways around the country.

Funded and supported by the William Penn Foundation, the centers aim to build capacity and increase their collective impact within the watershed and its communities. The centers are located

in diverse landscapes across the watershed- including densely populated urban areas, suburban spaces and rural regions. Individually and independently successful and collectively impactful, the centers network is built upon three key aspects: aligned communications, joint programming and shared professional development. We couldn't do what we do without the cooperative spirit among these organizations. Proud to be LEED GOLD Certified



Here at Berks Nature, we have some exciting news to share...

In March, we learned that The Nature Place was awarded LEED Gold status by the U.S. Green Building Council!

What does that mean? Here's a little cheat sheet: Leadership in Energy & Environmental Design (LEED) certification is bestowed by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) based on a rating system that measures a building's environmental impact. Projects earn LEED points based on items such as site selection, the management of the construction process, water efficiency, energy use, materials selection, indoor air quality, and educational impact.

"Achieving LEED certification by the USGBC was an intentional and important decision by our Board of Directors," Berks Nature President Kim Murphy said. "We knew The Nature Place needed to inspire others in the community through demonstration projects, and we are proud to receive recognition as a LEED Gold building in Berks."

Among the sustainable features you'll find at The Nature Place:

- 100% of the building's energy use offset by wind power.
- Over one third of the entire building is reclaimed and recycled materials, including wooden stair treads and carpet.
- Exterior siding reclaimed from Pennsylvania mushroom farms, and stone recycled from New England barns.
- Light-colored roofing that reflects rather than absorbs the sun's rays.
- Horizontal sun shades that act like visors on the windows, minimizing solar heat gain and glare inside the building.
- State-of-the-art bird-strike reduction glass
- Rain gardens to manage the building's stormwater, a Monarch-Way Station & Pollinator Garden
- Daylight sensor to automatically dim the lights in the building when the sun is shining.
- Native plant demonstration, a bio filter septic system, an observation bee hive and much, much more!

Since opening in 2017, "The Nature Place has already exemplified the concept of 'Building as a Teaching Tool," said Architect Kate Scurlock, of Baltimore-based GWWO Architects.

Early on in the design process, she added, Berks Nature identified LEED certification as an important goal for The Nature Place.

"After many discussions and careful tracking throughout design and construction, GWWO Architects is thrilled to have The Nature Place achieve LEED Gold," Scurlock said. "The Gold certification is due to hard work and coordination by the design and construction teams, along with Berks Nature's dedication to the conservation of the environment."

8,825 Acres of Land Protected

Our relationships with hundreds of landowners and partners protect important land and water resources. This will ensure clean drinking water and open space for future generations. Since 1974, a total of 8,825 acres has been protected by Berks Nature through conservation easements and land acquisitions.

200+ People engaged at 10th Annual State of the Environment Breakfast in November

Berks Nature has created numerous trails and connections, and manages 27 miles of trails in the Greater Reading area. Pick up a trail map inside The Nature Place lobby today!

Miles and miles of streams improved

Berks Nature and partners work with landowners throughout the year to improve water quality. This is done by planting trees along the streambanks, to installing Best Management Practices (BMPs) on farms and other properties. The use of BMPs on agricultural properties ensures pesticides, fertilizers, and animal waste are filtered out of storm water before they reach local waterways. Among our favorite projects this past year: Working with Governor Mifflin students to install a riparian buffer along Rabbit Run Stream on their campus!

60+ Boats

Our first-ever Angelica Creek Regatta was a runaway success, with students from neighboring Governor Mifflin School District building more than 60 boats, which they raced in teams down Angelica Creek in May. We're looking forward to our second Regatta next month!

Here at Berks Nature, we believe nature is essential to our quality of life. Our annual summer Eco-Camp is the perfect way to pass that value down to your child/children. We're excited to welcome campers back this summer for another season of exploration, learning, fun and nature-play at The Nature Place at Angelica Park!

Registration is now open for 2019 Eco-Camp!

Among the new and exciting things to look out for this summer:

- A special Eco-Camp sleepover at The Nature Place on Aug. 13th!
- Weekly hot dog parties around our new fire pit
- An exciting two-week weather-focused camp for campers in grades 5-8 (July 15-19; and July 22-26)
- Visits from the Nurture Your Nature Organization

Each week, the following age groups will be offered:

Preschool: Ages 3 (potty-trained) and up. This group will have their own preschool director and instructors, separate from the older campers.

*Grades K-4th, and 5th-8th:*Kindergarten through 4th grade will form the second camp group, followed by grades 5-8.

** Campers will be grouped according to age on excursions. Please note: scheduled trips, special group visits, and activities may be altered, changed or even cancelled due to unforeseen circumstances.

Weekly Themes & Fees Eco-Camp 2019 Themes and Full-Day Fees

Prices listed are per camper, per week, and reflect the extension activities planned for campers in grades 3-8 that week. Don't want to send your child for a full day of camp? We offer half-day, morning Eco-Camp at a rate of \$110/week per child. Before and after care available at \$25/each, a.m. and p.m., per week.

Week 1: Getting to Know Our Angelica Wetlands (June 10-14th) \$210/per camper

This week will be filled with chances to explore the wetlands, learn about the nature in it, and then transfer that knowledge and express those feelings in nature. Remember to bring your camera and any other tools to express what you want in your nature journal!

Week 2: Reptiles and Amphibians (June 17-21st) \$210/per camper (Preschool) \$235/per camper (K-8 with excursion)

What kinds of reptiles and amphibians inhabit the wetlands? We'll be on the search for these types of living organisms, with the help of our very own Charlie Randazzo. We'll take a trip to the Lehigh Valley Zoo to further discover some of those same critters that we find in the wetlands at Angelica. We'll also welcome a visit from Critter Connections, which will show us through hands-on learning the wildlife that calls Pennsylvania home.

Special Excursion: Lehigh Valley Zoo. Most of the campers will take a trip to the Lehigh Valley Zoo on Thursday, June 20th, and spend the day learning more about the animals of Pennsylvania.

Week 3: Wacky Science Experiments and the 3 R's (June 24-28th) \$210/per camper (Preschool) \$225/per camper (K-8 with excursion)

Reduce, reuse, recycle! This week, we'll tackle some cool science experiments that are backed by science principles, as well as create our own "junk art" out of the items we recycle. Additionally, we'll kick off our famous boat race, and egg drop extravaganza on the Schuylkill River Bridge. The week will end with a *pool party at the Ken Grill Pool in nearby Kenhorst.

Special Excursion: Ken Grill Pool. We'll cool off with a Ken Grill Pool Party, from noon-3pm on Wednesday, June 26th. Campers will walk to the pool on the milelong trail, and will be able to buy lunch at the pool and enjoy time with camper friends.

Week 4: Cyclemania Bike Week! (July 8-12th) \$210/per camper

Our popular bike week returns with rides of different distances and a rodeo that has never been seen before at The Nature Place. We'll welcome a visit from John Pacharis, of Berks Area Mountain Biking Association, who will join us on a bike hike. Among other things: we'll again ride to Gibraltar, where we'll stop at Scoupe deVille Ice Cream shop for a cool treat before heading back to The Nature Place.

*NOTE: Bike rides and activities will be based mostly on ability and not always age.

Week 5: Weather All Around Us (July 15-19th) \$210/per Camper

*Note: This is the first of a two-week weather camp for grades 5-8. The second week will take place July 22-26th.

our wetlands and collect weather data for NASA's GLOBE program (Global Learning an Observations to Benefit the Environment), as we welcome a visit from a NASA scientist this week! All campers will learn how to make clouds, and detect the different types of clouds and the amount of cloud cover in the sky. Older campers will track the weather all week long, before continuing with the unique the following week and digging a little deeper in to their learning.

Week 6: The Amazing World of Flying Insects (Preschool-4); & Weather All Around Us (continued for grades 5-8) (July 22-26th) \$210/per camper (Preschool) \$235/per camper (K-8 with excursion)

This week, we'll build a bug hotel, learn about our very own bees and go digging for all sorts of creepy crawlers. Note: Expect muddy campers at the end of each day, from digging in the soil at The Nature Place. We'll end the camp week with a trip to Hawk Mountain.

Special Excursion: Hawk Mountain. This all-day trip will take our campers on a trail hike to the North Lookout on Thursday,

July 25th. Two groups will be formed on the trip, with each group taking two different hiking trails to discover the wildlife on the mountain.

Week 7: Wild Things & Wilderness Survival (July 29-August 2nd) \$210/per camper (Preschool) \$235/per camper (K-8 with excursion)

Our popular Wild Things Week returns, where campers of all ages will learn how to survive in the wilderness using the bare necessities carried in a backpack. This week will include archery instruction and learning how to fish with a rod and bait, as well as first aid and basic survival skills, and using a compass.

Special Excursion: French Creek Park. We'll walk the trails and complete the orienteering course at French Creek on Wednesday, July 31st.

Week 8: Our Wacky Watersheds (August 5-9th) \$210/per camper (Preschool) \$235/per camper (K-8 with excursion)

Campers will learn the importance of

water to our daily lives, as well as what a watershed is and which one we live in, through interactive games and activities. We'll track the water and how it flows through our wetlands throughout the week, and pay a visit to Western Berks Water Authority and Blue Marsh Lake.

Week 9: Bat & Raptor Week (+ Camp Sleepover!) (August 12-16th) \$210/per camper (Preschool)

Our popular raptor week will highlight raptors and other animals from the Red Creek Wildlife Center. Now in her third year with visiting camp, Peggy from Red Creek will be showing us live birds and animals all week long. Additionally, we'll learn about the birds that make Angelica Park their home, and spy on our feathered friends through binoculars. We'll welcome a visit from Karen Campbell, a bat expert from Albright College.

*Note: Bring the whole family and join us on Tuesday evening, Aug. 13, from 6-8pm this week, to see bats in action at The Nature Place.

240 Acres Permanently Protected by Berks Nature in 2018

An update on our land efforts, by Berks Nature Land Protection Specialist Sarah Chudnovsky



Last year, Berks Nature partnered with landowners across the county to permanently protect 240 acres of woodland, meadow, and farmland. As we reflect on last year and look towards the rest of 2019, we're excited to share with you several projects completed in 2018, which highlight the range of our land protection work.

Throughout 2018, Berks Nature succeeded in establishing conservation easements with private landowners in the Hay Creek Watershed, the Oley Hills, and along the Kittatinny Ridge. Conservation easements, developed together with private landowners, keep land within family ownership while ensuring permanent protection of the natural resources that make Berks County special- our soil, our forests, our meadows, and our streams, creeks, and rivers. Currently, Berks Nature holds 129 conservation easements, which protect over 8,400 acres of open space across the county.

In the Hay Creek watershed in 2018, we protected 32 acres of woodland with the Meister family through the support of the Delaware River Watershed Initiative, and in partnership with Natural Lands. It's especially critical to protect unfragmented forest, and in southern Berks County, the forests of the Hay Creek watershed have a broader significance as part of the Hopewell Big Woods. According to the Hopewell Big Woods Coalition, which Berks Nature is a member of, "The Hopewell Big Woods is the last, large unbroken forest left in Southeastern PA, and is one of the most important natural areas in the region. It's an exceptional resource with hundreds of plant and bird species, pristine forest, unique wetlands, and clean streams providing open space, drinking water, and unique scenic, cultural and natural resources." This part of the county is already home to many acres of protected public landwith the Birdsboro Waters Preserve, French Creek State Park, and the William Penn State Forest District. Berks Nature's partners in the area, Natural Lands and the William Penn State Forest District, added 101 acres of public lands this past year as well through the Delaware River Watershed Initiative. We are proud to combine private conservation easements and public lands acquisitions to protect our unique landscape.



In the Oley Hills, Berks Nature has been working for many years to protect the forests that form the scenic backdrop of the Oley Valley. The Oley Hills produce six pristine, Exceptional Value (EV) streams, the highest designation given by the PA Department of Environmental Protection, which together make up 40% of the total pristine, EV streams found in the entire Schuylkill River Watershed. We are committed to working with residents and conservation partners to continue to invest in the area's legacy of conservation. By working with the Hill family in Pike and Oley townships, we protected 23 acres in 2018, including an important wetland and critical habitat for species of concern in the area. Also in 2018, we worked with landowners in the Butter Valley and the Ehst family to protect 30 acres of woodland that includes a tributary of the Perkiomen West Branch, and is located in the recharge area for the drinking water wells of the Village of Bally. Protecting clean water for our agricultural communities is a priority, and all over Berks County, we work towards healthy farms, healthy forests, and healthy streams.

In 2018, we conserved almost 150 acres in Albany Township through both private and public land protection. A conservation easement on 71 acres of the Durkin farm protects farmland, woodland, and a stretch of the Manor Creek. This now brings the total acres protected by the Durkin Winding Creek farm operation in the Manor Creek watershed to 353 acres, which includes 187.5 acres preserved with the Berks County Ag Land Preservation program. Just a couple miles north, a bit closer to the Blue Mountain, Berks Nature partnered with Hawk Mountain Sanctuary, The Conservation Fund, and the Pennsylvania Game Commission to conserve vital acreage for migratory birds by protecting a 77-acre parcel. With assistance from Berks Nature in securing a grant provided by The Conservation Fund, the Sanctuary purchased the tract, which was under threat from develop-

ers, and transferred it to the Pennsylvania Game Commission. Working with the Pennsylvania Game Commission, Berks Nature and the team at Hawk Mountain developed a plan to convert the former fields into native grasslands and meadows. In turn, this work will support migratory birds and other wildlife and expand recreational opportunities. During spring and fall, more than 150 species of raptors and songbirds follow the Blue Mountain, also known as the "Kittatinny Ridge" using habitats along its slope and base to rest and feed. The 2,500 acres at Hawk Mountain and the 9,000 acres of adjoining State Game Lands 106 offer healthy habitats for forest wildlife, but field, riparian, and wetland species have declined. Conservation of this property addresses a critical need for bird habitat locally and along the entire Ridge, as grassland and wetland birds are some of the fastest declining groups in Pennsylvania due to habitat loss. Insectivorous birds such as warblers, vireos, and flycatchers that depend upon the riparian areas or field edges will also benefit, and new foraging habitat will become available for bats, mammals, and migrating birds along with breeding areas for many amphibians.

Berks Nature is committed to creatively working with landowners and conservation partners to protect the natural resources of Berks County, and both of these projects in Albany Township build upon the legacy of our work in the Maiden Creek Watershed. The new addition to the Game Lands now permanently protects a stretch of the High Quality Designated Pine Creek, and the Durkin farm privately protects wooded riparian buffers of Manor Creek-both important Maiden Creek tributaries. Downstream, the Maiden Creek and Lake Ontelaunee serve as the source of drinking water for residents of the City of Reading. In 2019, Berks Nature is continuing to do outreach in every township along the mountain with landowners who are interested in protecting their land.

What is a Conservation Easement?

A conservation easement is a legal agreement between a landowner and a land trust (like Berks Nature) or government agency that permanently limits uses of the land in order to protect its conservation values. It allows you to continue to own and use your land and to sell it or pass it on to heirs. People execute a conservation easement because they love their open space land, and want to protect their land from future inappropriate development while keeping their private ownership of the property. Granting an easement to a conservation organization that qualifies under the Internal Revenue Code as a "public charity" – which Berks Nature does – can yield income and estate tax savings. Moreover, Berks Nature has the expertise and experience to work with landowners and ensure that the land will remain as permanent open space.

Background: With her degree in Secondary Education from Kutztown University, Risa worked for several years in that field, before devoting much of her life to being a stay-at-home moma decision that she says "afforded me the opportunity to work part-time as an education tutor and volunteer for environmental organization sin Berks County.

What keeps her coming back: "First, I love the mission of the organization (Berks Nature)- both the traditional mission of land preservation, and the newer mission of environmental education," she said. "But I think the camaraderie of the staff and volunteers here is the most rewarding. They are all such interesting people and they have a real enthusiasm for nature. One of the perks that I enjoy is learning so much by just spending time with them." After so many years with Berks Nature, Risa added, the staff and committee members have become a treasured part of her life, "a group of people who I admire very much, and with whom I have shared values and a commitment to preserve the natural world."

What we're saying about Risa: "Risa has been an important leader in many areas for Berks Nature," Berks Nature President Kim Murphy said. "An important advocate for environmental education, a long-term member and chair of our environment committee, board member and former board chair- Risa is as comfortable and effective in the board room as she is pulling invasives on Neversink Mountain. We've been fortunate to benefit from her leadership and hope to for many years to come."



Total Revenues: \$2,083,128.58


